## Governor Baker Announces Four-Phase Approach to Reopen the Massachusetts Economy

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On Monday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, Governor Baker unveiled his four-phase approach to reopen the economy in Massachusetts, a summary of which can be found at <a href="https://www.mass.gov/info-details/reopening-four-phase-approach">https://www.mass.gov/info-details/reopening-four-phase-approach</a>. Phase 1 of the plan began on May 18<sup>th</sup> allowing manufacturing and construction businesses to begin operations as well as worship services. More businesses will be permitted to open on May 25<sup>th</sup>, including lab and office spaces, barbershops and hair salons, pet grooming, car washes, curbside retail services, and certain recreation and outdoor activities.

Governor Baker's plan requires that all businesses create a written COVID-19 Control plan outlining how its workplace will prevent the spread of the virus before reopening. A template control plan may be found at <a href="https://www.mass.gov/doc/covid-19-reopening-control-plan-template/download">https://www.mass.gov/doc/covid-19-reopening-control-plan-template/download</a>. Businesses must then sign and post a compliance attestation poster acknowledging that they have a control plan in place. Additional posters regarding rules for social distancing, hygiene, cleaning, and disinfecting must also be posted in the workplace. Essential businesses that are already operating must comply with these requirements by May 25th.

The reopening plan contains mandatory safety standards for all workplaces including protocols for social distancing, hygiene, staffing and operations, and cleaning and disinfecting. In addition, the Commonwealth has issued sector-specific safety protocols which are mandatory for the businesses to which they apply.

In addition to complying with the Governor's reopening requirements, employers must also consider federal and state laws which will be implicated by return to work issues. In order to help guide employers through the return to work process, MHTL attorneys will be participating in two webinars on the topic of returning to work.

First, on **Thursday, May 21**<sup>st</sup> from **1PM** – **2PM**, Attorney Nan ONeill will be a panelist in a webinar jointly hosted by the Quincy Chamber of Commerce and the Neponset River Regional Chamber. Nan will be joined by Norman Eng, Public Affairs Specialist of the Small Business Administration, and the webinar will be moderated by Margaret LaForest, Regional Director of the MA Office of Business Development.
